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1. Are online samples generalizable to the general population?

YES*

More diversity in ethnicity, employment status and history, age, and education than student samples

*Dependent on online panel sample

2. Are the data obtained from online samples reliable and valid?

YES

Reliability and validity of online panel data can be equivalent to, or exceed that typically found in university samples

e.g., Behrend et al. (2011); Buhrmester et al. (2011); Casler et al. (2013); Paolacci et al. (2010)

Will participants report engaging in sexually aggressive behaviour in an online survey?

YES

Students and community men have reported engaging in sexually aggressive behaviour in online surveys in past research

(e.g., Greene & Davis, 2011; Voller & Long, 2010)



[Research Questions]

- 1. Do the implicit and explicit measures of attitudes towards rape have good reliability (internal consistency)?
- 2. Do the explicit measures of attitudes towards rape demonstrate convergent validity?
- 3. Are implicit and explicit attitudes towards rape associated with sexually aggressive behaviour?


Measures that assess automatic associations between a concept and an attribute


Implicit Association Test (IAT)


Implicit attitudes towards rape relative to consenting sex

Single category – IAT (SC-IAT)

Sexual Experience Survey- Attitudes
(SES-ATT)

Tactics vary and include verbal and physical coercion





[RQ3: Group Differences] 3 groups: None: No past sexually aggressive behaviour Verbal: Verbal coercion only Physical: Physical coercion and/or physical and verbal coercion







[Discussion]

No relationship between implicit attitudes toward rape and sexually aggressive behaviour
Inconsistent with prior research

Explicit attitudes toward rape associated with sexually aggressive behaviour
Consistent with hypotheses

Cross sectional research design
















[Implicit Attitudes Toward Rape]

Response latencies from different trial types are used to compute a difference score (D)

Positive D = Stronger associations between RAPE and positive

Negative D = Stronger associations between RAPE and negative
