Tim Shaw is Adjunct Professor of Political Science at Carleton & Visiting Professor in the McCormack Graduate School at UMass in Boston. After teaching for three decades at Dalhousie he recently animated graduate & research programmes in Commonwealth Studies in London & International Relations in Trinidad. Tim is currently coediting a series of titles for Ashgate & Palgrave Macmillan on African IR, regional cooperation in the Western Hemisphere, New Regionalisms & public policy in Africa.

Jane Parpart is currently a Visiting Professor at the Institute of Political Economy at Carleton University and professor emeritus from Dalhousie where she taught in International Development Studies, Gender Studies and History. She has recently been graduate coordinator at the Institute for Gender and Development Studies at the University of the West Indies in Trinidad and Tobago. Her most recent writings have been on masculinities and the new wars; gender mainstreaming and gender, violence and IR theories of (in)security.
