**Monica Patterson** (Ph.D., Anthropology and History, University of Michigan) is a postdoctoral fellow at the Centre for Ethnographic Research and Exhibition in the Aftermath of Violence (CEREV) in the Department of History at Concordia University. She is coeditor and contributing author of *Curating Difficult Knowledge: Violent Pasts in Public Places* (Palgrave, 2011) and *Anthrohistory: Unsettling Knowledge, Questioning Discipline* (University of Michigan Press, 2011).

Analyzing children as both icons and agents in the anti-apartheid struggle, this talk will explore visual culture as a source in historical, discursive, and ethnographic terms, while presenting some of the challenges of doing children's history.
