

EU and the Law: This lesson looks at the history and development of two distinct EU courts; the EU Court of Justice and EU Court of Human Rights. After an overview of both courts, the lesson provides examples of how the courts have handled and ruled on previous cases (e.g., Human Rights on the Armenian genocide; Court of Justice on Google "right to be forgotten").





EU: Refugee and Migrant Crisis: In September 2015, the EU faced an unprecedented number of refugees and migrants flooding across its border, fleeing instability and war in Africa and the Middle East. The migrant crisis has been hailed as Europe's worst refugee crisis since WWII. What challenges does the EU face in terms of admitting but also controlling the refugee/migrant influx? This lesson explores how the EU has responded to the crisis and what policies have been utilized.

EU: Tourism and Backpacking: Europe is a fascinating continent where many different cultures are submerged in close proximity. As the centre of world power for centuries, Europe has developed incredible sightseeing opportunities. The lesson will explore helpful tips and tricks when backpacking through Europe! The lesson will provide students information on exchange opportunities to study in Europe through ERAS-MUS.
