NEGOTIATING A NEW TREATY?

Canadian and EU heads of state meet twice a year for high-level summits where issues facing the international community are discussed.

They also discuss ways to improve trade and links between the two partners. Sometimes these discussions lead to new treaties, agreements and declarations written and signed by the EU and Canada.
