COURSE DESCRIPTION

In this course, we will explore the nature of religious experience and the ways in which such experiences are interpreted. Our study begins with a review of various definitions of religion in order to better understand what could be meant by "religious" experience. In examining the experiential aspect of religion, a large part of this course will concentrate on the non-literate mode of religious expression that scholars categorize as 'primal' or shamanic. Students will then discuss readings that represent the soteriological (salvation-oriented) world-views found in the major world religions as well as readings on the nature of mysticism. Finally, in Hesse's novel Siddhartha we will explore themes relating to shamanic world-views, belief in individual salvation, and mystic experience. Video and audio material will form part of the course content and students will have an opportunity to do some personal exploration of meditative states for themselves.
