

Managing international migration: Can India succeed?

Around the world, more and more people are moving across borders. These movements put pressure on countries to develop tools to manage the flows of migrants into and out of their countries. India with a soaring magnitude of population is no exception. Indians form a significant number of international migrants. However, the governance structure and policies that manage their migration have been developing at a slower pace. Dr. Rajan will contextualize the Indian case within the global scenario and discuss the current governance structure for Indian migration. Professor David Carment from the Norman Paterson School of International Affairs will moderate the discussion to follow.

Dr. S. Irudaya Rajan is Chair Professor, Ministry of Overseas Indian Affairs, in the Research Unit on International Migration at the Centre for Development Studies (CDS), Thiruvananthapuram in Southern India. He has thirty years of research experience with major migration surveys and has published extensively in national and international journals on social, economic and demographic implications on international migration. He is member of the National Migration Policy drafting group and editor of the Annual Series India Migration Report and Editor in chief of Routledge International Journal, Migration and Development.
