Susan Phillips, Carleton University

Dr. Susan Phillips is Professor and Director of the School of Public Policy and Administration, Carleton University where she has been a faculty member since 1988. She is also a Senior Researcher with the Centre for Voluntary Sector Research and Development (a joint research unit of Carleton and the University of Ottawa) and a Visiting Scholar with the Wellesley Institute. A political scientist by discipline, Susan did her undergraduate degree at the University of Victoria, a Masters at the University of Waterloo, and a doctorate at Carleton University.

Dr. Phillips has published extensively in the areas of public policy for the voluntary and nonprofit sector, citizen engagement, federalism and social policy, and urban governance. Her current research focuses on comparative analysis of the supporting architecture for models of shared governance and on the impact of accountability regimes associated with public funding of the voluntary sector. She has been an Associate Editor of *Canadian Public Policy*, an editor of *How Ottawa Spends*, and is a member of the editorial board of the *Philanthropist*. She has also been a Policy Advisor to national voluntary organizations, urban governments and a variety of federal departments and sits as a board member of Volunteer Canada. Sheila Niven was appointed Adviser to the Governor of the Bank of Canada in 2008, with assignments in the economic policy area, as well as a special focus on strategic issues and policies in corporate administration. She is a member of the Bank's Corporate Management Committee.

Born in Bulawayo, Zimbabwe, Ms. Niven studied economics and psychology at the University of Natal, South Africa, receiving a bachelor of science honours degree in 1976. While on a Rhodes Scholarship at Oxford University, she graduated with a bachelor's degree in politics and economics in 1979, followed by an MA.

Ms. Niven joined the Bank of Canada in 1987, following three years as a Lecturer in Economics at the University of Natal, South Africa, and a period with Standard Merchant Bank in Johannesburg. In her 22-year career at the Bank of Canada, she has held a variety of positions of increasing seniority.

Lynn Eakin and Associates

Lynn Eakin has been providing consulting services to the nonprofit sector since 1989. Initially she provided services to sector organizations that included assistance with restructuring, mergers and service partnerships. She also provided rescue management services for organizations in difficulty. Currently, as a Metcalf Foundation Fellow, Lynn is involved in the establishment of the Ontario Nonprofit Network, (ONN) to better position the sector to address the cross cutting policy issues it faces.

Hillary Pearson, Philanthropic Foundations Canada

Hilary Pearson's career has spanned all three sectors, public, private and not-for-profit. She began her career with the Canadian federal government where she spent over 12 years as a policy analyst and senior manager. Moving to Montreal in 1993, Ms Pearson became Vice-President, Strategic Development, at Royal Bank of Canada. In 1996, she became a management consultant and began to work in the non-profit sector, with a wide range of clients, from national membership organizations and operating charities to local organizations in the health, cultural and social services field. Marion is currently the Chief Executive Officer of the Canadian Mental Health Association, Ottawa Branch. Her academic background is in pharmacy and physiological psychology (now cognitive neurosciences) at the master's degree level. For 18 years, she held the position of Managing Director of the Behavioural Medicine Unit, Department of Medicine, McMaster University, Hamilton Ontario.

For the past 13 years, she has provided leadership in the community mental health field in Ontario, as Executive Director of 3 branches of the Canadian Mental Health Association and on numerous provincial task forces.

Marion is a co-author of a national policy paper on Recovery (in the mental health field) and a Master trainer in Applied Suicide Intervention Skills Training (ASIST) program. He has had a life-long interest in public opinion research, participating in media polling with the CBC and the Globe and Mail and later conducting research in the Middle East, which he presented at the U.S. State Department, the Office of the Vice-President of the United States and the Canadian Department of Foreign Affairs.

He is currently Executive Director of EKOS Research Associates, a leading Canadian public opinion research firm, where he manages the political and media polling.
