## **General Description:**

ENGL 2008 is an introductory course which examines a diverse range of literary materials from the oral tradition through to classical and on to very contemporary works in many genres. Students are encouraged to consider an inter-disciplinary approach to the materials and strive to know and appreciate the respective historical, cultural, and psychological contexts.

The focus remains on the texts rather than on specific theories although common mythic theorists, literary concepts, genres, literary structures, and writing techniques serve as analytical and comparative references.

The course explores an eclectic set of myths and symbols including classical allusions, creation and destruction myths, hero/heroine myths, 'modern' myths and symbols such as tricksters, archetypes, Faustian myths, folk tales, fairy tales, and ritual prototypes.

Students who chose this course MUST BE PREPARED TO ATTEND CLASS AND TO READ THE CORE AND PRIMARY TEXTS. It is assumed that the students are also <u>seriously</u> interested in examining psychological and symbolic aspects of literary texts as well as pursuing universal mythological elements in literature.

The FOUR core objectives for ENGL 2008 are the following:

- ~ to know the universal constructs of what constitutes a myth and a symbol as distinct literary, cultural, and historical entities;
- ~ to develop a knowledge base of numerous western and eastern myths, their common symbols, and constructs;
  - ~ to appreciate the evolutionary nature of myths and symbols; and
- ~ to enhance one's own awareness and appreciation of the interrelatedness of myth, symbols, and mythologies in global contexts.
