Course description:

This course will explore the ways in which twentieth- and twenty-first-century American literature represents, reflects, and responds to some of the most popular and controversial cultural debates that have shaped and continued to shape the nation. Such cultural debates often revolve around particular historical events (including, for example, slavery and its aftermath; the assassination of President John F. Kennedy; the Cuban Missile Crisis; the Cold War; and the events of 9/11), as well as larger political, cultural, aesthetic, and social issues (including the rise of industrialism and urbanization; the emergence of the iconic feminist figure of the "New Woman": extremely tense, if not hostile political relations between Westernized/capitalist nations and communist Eastern Europe; and the "war on terrorism"). In particular, we will investigate the depiction of cultural anxieties related to radical transformations in gender, racial, ethnic, class, political, and sexual identities of American individuals in the novels of Kate Chopin, E.L. Doctorow, Don Delillo, Toni Morrison, Jonathon Safron Foer, and the poetry of Allan Ginsberg.
