Shakespeare in Performance

"The Play's the Thing"

Shakespeare's plays have remained popular since they were first performed over 400 years ago. This course will take students through the process of adapting, rehearing and performing a Shakespearean play.

Course Objective

Students will leave this class with an understanding of the requirements of mounting a piece of theatre based on a classical work. Questions of design and interpretation will be approached under the guidance of a professional theatre artist. The class will work in collaboration with the students of the Theatre Production Workshop being offered by the School of Architecture. The course will culminate in a presentation of the piece for an invited audience.

Class Format

We will meet once a week for three hours. Some additional rehearsal time will be necessary throughout the term. Students will be expected to do a minimum of 4 hours per week of research, writing and preparation for rehearsal.

Each class will contain four sections:

- 1. Physical and vocal warm-up; skill building exercises
- 2. Discussion/lecture/group work
- 3. Rehearsal/presentation
- 4. Check in re progress
