ASSIGNMENTS

SEMINARS:

Class presentations will focus on an aspect of the text under study that week. Presentations will address questions raised by the narrative, explore problems in relation to it, and/or assess its social and cultural movements.

ESSAY TOPIC

Due Date: November 11, 2013 Length: 3000-3500 words (12-15 pp.)

Students will submit a critical assessment of one of the questions (or figures) that has arisen from the course material. Essays will comprise well-researched and scholarly analyses of the issue under study.

For Students with Disabilities:
