## Course Description

The course will begin with a consideration of the idea of bohemia as it emerged in Paris in the 1800s following the turbulence of the Revolution and the Napoleonic wars. By mid-century, Parisian bohemia was famous as a haven for both artists and eccentrics, a space where creativity was prized and transgression was permitted and even celebrated. The concept was widely exported and by the late 1800s America had a burgeoning bohemian culture as well. The analysis of early bohemia provided by Walter Benjamin, Pierre Bourdieu, Jerrold Seigel and others will frame our approach to American bohemians and bohemian subcultures including the Greenwich Village group that formed around the turn of the $20^{\text {th }}$ century, Henry Miller and Anais Nin, the Beat Generation and the hippies. The course will conclude with a look at the recent studies of bohemia by Richard Florida and others. Issues to be considered along the way include bohemia as a response to capitalism and to bourgeois conventions, the overlap between bohemians and the lumpenproletariat, gender relations in bohemia, the relation of bohemia to the avantgarde, and bohemians and political commitment.
