## Message from the Incoming Director

---

In an atmosphere of restraint, EURUS continues its growth. As I prepare to assume the directorship in January 2010, I am pleased to welcome a new EURUS faculty colleague, Crina Viju. Dr. Viju will teach courses on the economics of transition and assist in our internship program. She has already begun supervising students and advancing her research interests since arriving this summer. Her arrival is only one highlight of this fall semester. We have also had visits from the Canadian ambassadors to Russia and to Serbia, the Republic of Macedonia, and Montenegro. Thanks in large part to the efforts of Joan DeBardeleben, the European Union has renewed its recognition of our affiliated research centre, the Centre of European Studies, as an EU Centre of Excellence. The designation releases funding for numerous student and faculty initiatives. Piotr Dutkiewicz trekked to Siberia to attend the annual Valdai group meetings, highlighted by discussions with Russian President Medvedev and Prime Minister Putin. And, of course, once again we welcome dynamic and diverse new students at the BA and MA levels. In the MA core seminar, which I co-teach with Professor Dutkiewicz, our students' interests run the gamut from British press representations of European integration following the Second World War to regionalism in contemporary Central Asia.

The current economic crisis, nonetheless, means that I will take the helm of EURUS at a challenging period. Across campus, we are being asked to do more with less. With the help of my colleagues, I approach this time as one of opportunity, to expand relationships with outside partners, from NGOs to businesses. We also need to strengthen ties with our alumni, who are not only crucial in fundraising efforts, but also provide us with contacts for cooperative ventures and leads for students seeking internships or employment. We continue to have a strong record of placing graduates in the Canadian government as well as with NGOs, as well as in funded spots in Ph. D. programs.

Finally, I want to thank Joan DeBardeleben for taking over as director this fall, to allow me time to make the transition to administration. I look forward to continuing the successes of past Institute directors, and strengthening EURUS' capacity and reputation as a premier location, not only nationally but also worldwide, to study and research Europe, Russia, and Eurasia.

## Faculty and Associate News

**Andrea Chandler** (Department of Political Science) was invited to join the Editorial Advisory Board of the *Canadian Journal of Political Science* for a three-year term as of July 2009. She was also the Programme Committee Chair for the Annual meeting of the Canadian Association of Slavists, which was held at Carleton University on 23-25 May 2009. She was elected as one of two Vice-Presidents of the Canadian Association of Slavists for the year 2009-2010. Finally, Chandler was a participant in a workshop on "Gender and Multi-Level Governance," at the annual conference of the Canadian Political Science Association, on 27 May 2009 at Carleton University in Ottawa. At the workshop, she gave a presentation on the case of Russia.

**Joan DeBardleben** is serving as Director of EURUS from 1 July 2009 through 31 December 2010. She continues in her role as Director of the Centre for European Studies (designated by the European Commission as an EU Centre of Excellence), and the Canada-Europe Transatlantic Dialogue, a strategic knowledge cluster funded by the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council of Canada.

The Youth at Risk (YAR) Project is managed by the Association of Universities and Colleges of Canada (AUCC) in partnership with Russian Lead Institution “No to Alcoholism and Drug Addiction”. The project aims to improve the social integration of youth at risk—youth in conflict with the law, substance abusers, neglected, abandoned, marginalised, institutionalised, etc., their families in the Russian Federation and introduce children’s rights as the standard to assess service provision in various spheres—social, judicial, educational, and law enforcement.

## Introduction to Crina Viju

---

Crina Viju was born and raised in the southern part of Romania. After she received her B.Sc. and M.Sc. in the Business Data Processing department at the “Babes-Bolyai” University of Cluj-Napoca, Romania, she continued her graduate studies at the Mediterranean Agronomic Institute of Chania (MAICH), Crete, Greece where she obtained a M.Sc. in the Economic and Management Science department. In June 2008 she got her Ph.D. in Bioresource Policy, Business and Economics department at the University of Saskatchewan.

For a period of two years, from July 2007 to July 2009, Dr. Viju was an Assistant Professor in the Johnson – Shoyama School of Public Policy, University of Regina. Crina is currently an Assistant Professor in the Institute for European, Russian and Eurasian Studies at the Carleton University.

Viju’s research is centered on a variety of economic issues, including the investment market in emerging economies and the economic effects of different trade policies applied within the US, Canada and the European Union. Some of the issues Viju has been working on lately are related to international trade problems. First, she deals with the question of climate change using modern investment theory (option values) to assess biofuels policy initiatives in the context of the international economy. Second, she investigates empirically the nature of market integration for a number of key agricultural products in the European Union, a method that can be applied to questions relating to globalization. A final topic of interest is dumping and the strategies of firms in the face of anti-dumping action.

Currently, she is also involved in projects with a number of scholars. Topics include the assessment of main agricultural issues in the Canada-EU free trade negotiations; the assessment of different international regulations included in the Trade-Related Aspects of Intellectual Property Rights (TRIPS) agreement on public health issues; the impact of innovation and nutrition/healthier foods on population health in OECD countries in the presence of international regulations; the measurement of the effectiveness of provincial health care systems in Canada using diabetes and a basket of amenable mortality rates; the efficiency of medical tourism and main international rules included in TRIPS that led to the increase in this activity over the past few years.

In recent years Dr. Viju has taught undergraduate and graduate economic courses including Economics for Public Policy, International Trade Policy, Health Economics, Public Finance, Econometrics and European Economic Integration.

Dr. Viju is a new member of two Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada (AAFC) Policy Research Networks --the Canadian Agricultural Trade Policy Research Network and the Canadian Agricultural Innovation Research Network (CAIRN),



which were introduced to develop strong linkages between policy research and the AAFC policy community by developing and supporting clusters of agricultural policy research at universities across Canada. Her membership in these networks gives her the opportunity to work with other researchers, to participate in debates on different public policy issues, and to get involved in graduate student supervision.
