CLCV 1003 B is an introduction to the study of Roman antiquity from the time of the founding of Rome in the eighth century B.C. down to the end of the Western Roman Empire in the fifth century $A.D.^1$ Rome's culture and society will be put in their historical context through the lectures and studied in part through readings, through translations from representative ancient authors, and through the art and architecture of the period.

Course work will require the writing of two non-cumulative tests (multiple choice, fill-in-the-blank, map component, and possibly slide identifications) worth 2 x 30 = 60% and a cumulative final examination (of similar format to the tests but without maps) worth 40%. The final will be scheduled by the Registrar's Office and written during the exam period following the end of classes in December; for the dates of the tests see below:²

PLAGIARISM

The University Senate defines plagiarism as "presenting, whether intentional or not, the ideas, expression of ideas or work of others as one's own." This can include:

- reproducing or paraphrasing portions of someone else's published or unpublished material, regardless of the source, and presenting these as one's own without proper citation or reference to the original source;
- submitting a take-home examination, essay, laboratory report or other assignment written, in whole or in part, by someone else;

- handing in "substantially the same piece of work for academic credit more than once without prior written permission of the course instructor in which the submission occurs."

Plagiarism is a serious offence which cannot be resolved directly with the course's instructor. The Associate Deans of the Faculty conduct a rigorous investigation, including an interview with the student, when an instructor suspects a piece of work has been plagiarized. Penalties are not trivial. They can include a final grade of "F" for the course
