OBJECTIVES

A study of classical mythology, emphasizing its use in Greek and Roman literature and its place in classical art and religion. There is some discussion of classical myths in terms of contemporary interpretations of myth. Also listed as ENGL 2500. Precludes additional credit for CLCV 2000 and ENGL 2007 (no longer offered).

Prerequisite(s): second-year standing or permission of the unit.

PARTICIPATION

Attendance is mandatory for this course. Much of the material covered is available only in the lectures. The midterm and final exams will be based mainly on the lectures, although there will also be material from the readings. Students who miss lectures do not do very well on the exams.

Students are expected to check their university email regularly and also to visit the course website on CuLearn often. This is how I will communicate with you.

COURSE STRUCTURE

The course material is divided into 6 modules. The format will be standard lectures. Each class will cover two "lectures" divided by a 10 minute break, since we are to cover an entire semester in only two months. The course schedule below is a guide to the material to be covered in each lecture. Adjustments may be made to the schedule based on class needs. Please note that Monday May 30th has lectures from two different modules.

MIDTERM AND FINAL EXAMINATIONS

The midterm examination will be held on Wednesday, May 25th. It will cover material from the beginning of the course to the end of Module 3 (the lectures on May 16th). It will be worth 50% of the final grade for the course. Proper documentation (sick note, death certificate, etc) must be provided in order to write a missed exam. There is no make-up exam and students may not rewrite the exam to raise their marks.

The final examination will be scheduled by the Registrar's Office. Students are advised not to make travel plans during the final examination period. The final examination will

be worth 60% of the overall mark for the course. It will cover material from Modules 4-6 (May 18th will be the first lecture for material covered on the final exam).

PLAGIARISM

The University Senate defines plagiarism as "presenting, whether intentional or not, the ideas, expression of ideas or work of others as one's own." This can include:

- reproducing or paraphrasing portions of someone else's published or unpublished material, regardless of the source, and presenting these as one's own without proper citation or reference to the original source;
- submitting a take-home examination, essay, laboratory report or other assignment written, in whole or in part, by someone else;
- using ideas or direct, verbatim quotations, or paraphrased concepts, or ideas material. without appropriate acknowledgment in any academic assignment;
- using another's data or research findings;
- failing to acknowledge sources through the use of proper citations when using another's works and/or failing to use quotation marks:
- handing in "substantially the same piece of work for academic credit more than once without prior written permission of the course instructor in which the submission occurs.'

Plagiarism is a serious offence which cannot be resolved directly with the course's instructor. The Associate Deans of the Faculty conduct a rigorous investigation, including an interview with the student, when an instructor suspects a piece of work has been plagiarized. Penalties are not trivial. They can include a final grade of "F" for the course
