Course Description:

The Ancient Near East is an amorphous collection of cultures, both Indo-European and Semitic which opposed and succeeded one another, but also combined with one another in multiple ways that still resonate in the Mid-East and eastern Mediterranean. The earliest of these civilizations are older than the Egyptian dynasties, and Egypt owes much of her development to Near Eastern innovations and culture. Eventually, the Romans and the Greeks made their presence felt in these regions and their awe and perplexity at the cultures is palpable. This course ends with the campaigns of Alexander who truly never understood what he conquered.
