Contents of this course vary from year to year. This year we will examine in detail the history, culture, and institutions of ancient Sparta from the Bronze Age to the Classical period. We will also address some of the myths and changing interpretations of the Spartans that have arisen from antiquity to modern times.

Prerequisite: CLCV 2900 or permission of the unit.

The final date for voluntary withdrawal without academic penalty is **December 5, 2011.**

<u>Tests and Exams:</u> All tests will consist of various types of questions, but certainly essays. <u>No aids</u> are allowed during tests and exams. **Make-up tests** will only be given for valid medical reasons. The professor must be informed of such cases *immediately* and appropriate documentation must be produced. Make-up tests are normally scheduled <u>within one week</u> of the original test, and at the convenience of the <u>professor</u>. Students will be expected to produce their Carleton Student ID card at the final exam.

Research Assignments: Students may develop their own essay topic IN CONSULTATION WITH THE PROFESSOR. All topics <u>must</u> be approved in preliminary form by the professor by **October 5, 2011**. Students are encouraged to meet with the professor for help developing a topic. I do <u>not</u> accept or grade essays on topics that have not been approved.

Your research bibliography and essay must be <u>submitted in hard copy</u>. I do not accept electronic submissions. These requirements are due <u>by the end of their respective classes</u>. If they are not in my hands by the time I leave the classroom on those dates, they will be considered late and a penalty will be assessed (see below). That includes if you have dropped them off in ANY departmental drop box, or given them to an Administrative Assistant.

<u>Late policy</u>: The penalty for late submission will be 10% subtracted from the grade for each working day late (ie. 1 day = minus 10%; 2 days = minus 20%; 3 days = minus 30%; 4 days = minus 40%; 5 days = minus 50%). After five days, the late work will receive a mark of zero.

<u>Academic offences</u>: All students are expected to know what constitutes an academic offence, to avoid committing academic offences, and to take responsibility for their academic actions. Academic offences include such things as plagiarism, cheating, improper research, obstructing academic activity, double submission, unauthorized cooperation / collaboration, impersonation, falsification etc. When the

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commission of an offence is established, penalties will be imposed in accordance with the regulations of the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences.

The <u>minimum</u> penalty assigned to any requirement in this course that is affected by an academic offence will be a mark of *zero* for the affected work.

Information about academic offences and student discipline can be found in the university calendar under Student Conduct (Section 14.0 Academic Integrity). If you need help in learning how to avoid academic offences or clarification of aspects of the discipline policy, ask the professor!

I will NOT reply to emails from other private email addresses. Students will be responsible for reading and responding appropriately to all information posted on WebCT. Information on WebCT will be considered to have been released to all registered students within 24 hours of posting.

COPIES OF WRITTEN WORK SUBMITTED

Always retain for yourself a copy of all essays, term papers, written assignments or take-home tests submitted in your courses.

PLAGIARISM

The University Senate defines plagiarism as "presenting, whether intentional or not, the ideas, expression of ideas or work of others as one's own." This can include:

- reproducing or paraphrasing portions of someone else's published or unpublished material, regardless of the source, and presenting these as one's own without proper citation or reference to the original source;
- submitting a take-home examination, essay, laboratory report or other assignment written, in whole or in part, by someone else;
- using ideas or direct, verbatim quotations, or paraphrased material, concepts, or ideas without appropriate acknowledgment in any academic assignment;
- using another's data or research findings;
- failing to acknowledge sources through the use of proper citations when using another's works and/or failing to use quotation marks;
- handing in "substantially the same piece of work for academic credit more than once without prior written permission of the course instructor in which the submission occurs."

Plagiarism is a serious offence which cannot be resolved directly with the course's instructor. The Associate Deans of the Faculty conduct a rigorous investigation, including an interview with the student, when an instructor suspects a piece of work has been plagiarized. Penalties are not trivial. They can include a final grade of "F" for the course
