This course examines the history of ancient Greece to the conquest of Asia by Alexander the Great with special attention to the development of her characteristic institutions.

Prerequisite: second year standing or permission of the unit.

\*The **Group Research Project** will be worth **25%** of each student's final mark. The project has 3 mandatory parts (1.Research Bibliography, 2.Analysis, 3.Evaluation). The mark for part 1 will not be applied to a student's grade in this class until all three parts of the project have been submitted. Information about what is required in each part of the Project, and how each will be marked will be posted on WebCT. Sign up for a topic to research by **October 28, 2009.** 

The final date for withdrawal from this course without academic penalty is March 12, 2010.

**Tests:** All tests and exams will include various types of questions (short answer, essays, commentaries etc.). Each test will cover material since the start of term <u>or</u> since the previous test. Knowledge of material from the entire course will enrich responses on all tests. The subject of this course is cumulative and students are encouraged to incorporate information from earlier lectures into later tests.

**Make-up tests** will only be given for valid, documented medical reasons. The professor must be informed of such cases <u>immediately</u>. Make-up tests are normally written within one week of the original test and at the convenience of the <u>professor</u>.

**Due dates and Late policy:** The three research requirements are due by the end of their respective classes. If they are not in my possession by the time I leave class on those dates, they will be considered late. The penalty for late submission of research requirements is 10% subtracted from the grade for each

working day late (ie. 1 day = minus 10%; 2 days = minus 20%; 3 days = minus 30%; 4 days = minus 40%; 5 days = minus 50%). After five days, the work will receive a mark of zero.

**Academic offences:** All students are expected to know what constitutes an academic offence, to avoid committing academic offences, and to take responsibility for their academic actions. When the commission of an offence (such as plagiarism, cheating, improper research, obstructing academic activity, double submission, unauthorized collaboration, impersonation, falsification etc.) is established, penalties will be imposed in accordance with the regulations of the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences.

# The <u>minimum</u> penalty assigned to any requirement in this course that is affected by an academic offence will be a mark of *zero* for the work.

#### REGULATIONS COMMON TO ALL HUMANITIES COURSES

#### COPIES OF WRITTEN WORK SUBMITTED

Always retain for yourself a copy of all essays, term papers, written assignments or take-home tests submitted in your courses.

#### PLAGIARISM

The University Senate defines plagiarism as "presenting, whether intentional or not, the ideas, expression of ideas or work of others as one's own." This can include:

- reproducing or paraphrasing portions of someone else's published or unpublished material, regardless of the source, and presenting these as one's own without proper citation or reference to the original source;
- submitting a take-home examination, essay, laboratory report or other assignment written, in whole or in part, by someone else;
- using ideas or direct, verbatim quotations, or paraphrased material, concepts, or ideas without appropriate acknowledgment in any academic assignment;
- using another's data or research findings;
- failing to acknowledge sources through the use of proper citations when using another's works and/or failing to use quotation marks;
- handing in "substantially the same piece of work for academic credit more than once without prior written permission of the course instructor in which the submission occurs."

Plagiarism is a serious offence which cannot be resolved directly with the course's instructor. The Associate Deans of the Faculty conduct a rigorous investigation, including an interview with the student, when an instructor suspects a piece of work has been plagiarized. Penalties are not trivial. They range from a mark of zero for the plagiarized work to a final grade of "F" for the course, and even suspension from all studies or expulsion from the University.
