**Course Description**: The purpose of this course is to provide an overview of the history and civilization of Rome and its empire from the beginning to the end of the early imperial period (2<sup>nd</sup> c. A.D.).

Text: Mary T. Boatwright et al., The Romans: from Village to Empire, 2<sup>nd</sup> ed., Oxford University Press, 2012.

**Course Requirements**: The course will be based solely on the textbook and my lectures. There will be no other requirement, though extra reading is encouraged.

**Evaluation:** Two in-class quizzes, each worth 30% of the final grade, and a final examination on the regular schedule worth 40%. Each quiz will be based on the previous four weeks' material. The two quizzes will be held on the Wednesday of the relevant week. The final examination will be based on the whole course. Early or deferred examinations will not be granted for this course.

### **PLAGIARISM**

The University Senate defines plagiarism as "presenting, whether intentional or not, the ideas, expression of ideas or work of others as one's own." This can include:

- reproducing or paraphrasing portions of someone else's published or unpublished material, regardless of the source, and presenting these as one's own without proper citation or reference to the original source;
- submitting a take-home examination, essay, laboratory report or other assignment written, in whole or in part, by someone else;
- using ideas or direct, verbatim quotations, or paraphrased material, concepts, or ideas without appropriate acknowledgment in any academic assignment;
- using another's data or research findings;
- failing to acknowledge sources through the use of proper citations when using another's works and/or failing to use quotation marks;
- handing in "substantially the same piece of work for academic credit more than once without prior written permission of the course instructor in which the submission occurs."

Plagiarism is a serious offence which cannot be resolved directly with the course's instructor. The Associate Deans of the Faculty conduct a rigorous investigation, including an interview with the student, when an instructor suspects a piece of work has been plagiarized. Penalties are not trivial. They can include a final grade of "F" for the course
