### **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

This course will provide students with more advanced knowledge of morphology, grammar and vocabulary of ancient Greek. Students will become more aware of the structure and functioning of the language, and, eventually, feel more at ease and familiar with original Greek texts and their translation. A quick overview of topics covered will be given as a starting point to move forward in Shelmerdine's text. The aim is to work through chapters 13-24 this term, but pace may vary. The course will complete the study of nouns belonging to the third declension, then the different types of adjective, and most importantly, introduce more forms of the Greek verb and its articulation.

# REQUIREMENTS AND ATTENDANCE

Students are expected to have a preliminary knowledge of topics contained in chapters 1-12 in Shelmerdine's text. This course will build upon that foundation. Students are expected to attend classes regularly and keep pace. Key factors to help with this will be constant exercises, homework, and active participation in class. Students are encouraged to ask questions, take chances, and rely on the instructor and TA for whatever difficulty they may encounter in studying Greek.

#### **PLAGIARISM**

- submitting a take-home examination, essay, laboratory report or other assignment written, in whole or in part, by someone else;
- using ideas or direct, verbatim quotations, or paraphrased material, concepts, or ideas without appropriate acknowledgment in any academic assignment;
- using another's data or research findings;
- failing to acknowledge sources through the use of proper citations when using another's works and/or failing to use quotation marks;
- handing in "substantially the same piece of work for academic credit more than once without prior written permission of the course instructor in which the submission occurs."

Plagiarism is a serious offence which cannot be resolved directly with the course's instructor. The Associate Deans of the Faculty conduct a rigorous investigation, including an interview with the student, when an instructor suspects a piece of work has been plagiarized. Penalties are not trivial. They can include a final grade of "F" for the course
