COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is designed for beginners in Latin. It will introduce students to the grammatical structure of Latin, which is very different from that of English, and give practice in reading Latin and translating from one language to the other. We plan to cover the first twelve chapters in *Wheelock's Latin*. See Course Calendar for specifics.

By learning Latin you will gain access in the original to the rich Latin literature of the Classical period, as well as that of the Middle Ages and Renaissance. Latin remained the main language of international communication until the nineteenth century. It is also the mother language of the Romance languages (Italian, French, Spanish, Portuguese, Romanian etc.) and is the source of about 60-70% of English vocabulary.

Now a note of warning. Learning Latin requires a readiness to learn not only vocabulary but also many grammatical forms. This is because Latin (like e.g. Russian) is an inflected language, one in which changes in word endings are used to make the words' functions clear. These endings must be learned if you are to make progress. **Steady work throughout the term is essential.**

COPIES OF WRITTEN WORK SUBMITTED

Always retain for yourself a copy of all essays, term papers, written assignments or take-home tests submitted in your courses.

PLAGIARISM

The University Senate defines plagiarism as "presenting, whether intentional or not, the ideas, expression of ideas or work of others as one's own." This can include:

- reproducing or paraphrasing portions of someone else's published or unpublished material, regardless of the source, and presenting these as one's own without proper citation or reference to the original source;
- submitting a take-home examination, essay, laboratory report or other assignment written, in whole or in part, by someone else;
- using ideas or direct, verbatim quotations, or paraphrased material, concepts, or ideas without appropriate acknowledgment in any academic assignment;
- using another's data or research findings;
- failing to acknowledge sources through the use of proper citations when using another's works and/or failing to use quotation marks;
- handing in "substantially the same piece of work for academic credit more than once without prior written permission of the course instructor in which the submission occurs."

Plagiarism is a serious offence which cannot be resolved directly with the course's instructor. The Associate Deans of the Faculty conduct a rigorous investigation, including an interview with the student, when an instructor suspects a piece of work has been plagiarized. Penalties are not trivial. They can include a final grade of "F" for the course
