Course Description:

LATN 2200 is a course for students who have completed LATN 1006 or the equivalent. Course work involves the material in Shelmerdine (see details below), chapters 21-32 (including Reading Chapter 5), which will be covered at the rate of roughly one chapter per week. The text provides sentences and readings from a wide range of Latin authors. There will also be some practice in translation from English into Latin.

Course work [vocabulary and other quizzes (30%), a midterm test (30%)] including class attendance will count 60% of your final grade; a two-hour final examination (during the December exam period), covering the term's work but with added stress on the material after the midterm, will count 40%.

<u>Steady work</u> along with <u>regular attendance</u> throughout the term is <u>essential</u> to keeping on top of the course material.

PLAGIARISM

The University Senate defines plagiarism as "presenting, whether intentional or not, the ideas, expression of ideas or work of others as one's own." This can include:

- reproducing or paraphrasing portions of someone else's published or unpublished material, regardless of the source, and presenting these as one's own without proper citation or reference to the original source;
- submitting a take-home examination, essay, laboratory report or other assignment written, in whole or in part, by someone else;
- using ideas or direct, verbatim quotations, or paraphrased material, concepts, or ideas without appropriate acknowledgment in any academic assignment;
- using another's data or research findings;
- failing to acknowledge sources through the use of proper citations when using another's works and/or failing to use quotation marks;
- handing in "substantially the same piece of work for academic credit more than once without prior written permission of the course instructor in which the submission occurs."

Plagiarism is a serious offence which cannot be resolved directly with the course's instructor. The Associate Deans of the Faculty conduct a rigorous investigation, including an interview with the student, when an instructor suspects a piece of work has been plagiarized. Penalties are not trivial. They can include a final grade of "F" for the course
