## **COURSE DESCRIPTION AND OBJECTIVES:**

This course provides an introduction to the field of Canadian legal studies. It will provide critical lenses on the procedure and substance of Canadian law. To meet the course objectives, by the end of the academic year, students will:

# 1) Attain a basic knowledge of the <u>processes</u> through which the legal system in Canada operates by;

- a) Developing familiarity with recognized sources of Canadian law;
- b) Understanding the structure and function of Canadian legal institutions, our processes of law-making;
- c) Appreciating the roles of various actors in the legal process.
- 2) Gain an understanding of core areas of <u>substantive law</u> in effect in Canada including:
- a) Criminal law,
- b) Constitutional law,
- c) Property law, including aboriginal land claims,
- d) Contract law, and
- e) Tort law

# 3) Learn ways to <u>think critically</u> about our laws and legal system as well as their relationships to society and social change. Students will be introduced to:

- a) a variety of theoretical perspectives about the role of law in shaping relationships between individuals and groups,
- b) perspectives on the involvement of law in relations between the state and society,
- c) lenses on ways in which the law may serve particular societal interests, and
- d) roles that law plays, or could play, in advancing, accelerating, preventing, or inhibiting social change.

#### **LECTURES AND READINGS**

A list of lecture topics and assigned readings is outlined below. It is expected that students will complete each week's assigned readings prior to Friday's lecture. Lectures will identify and build on important themes raised in the readings, but I will not simply repeat material in the readings. Please also note that there is material additional to that covered in the readings presented in the lectures. Students are encouraged to take detailed notes during lectures.

### **TUTORIALS**

Attendance at tutorials is MANDATORY. Marks are allocated to participation in tutorials. Tutorials will be the venue in this course where skills necessary for effectively completing the assignments are taught. Tutorial support will also help students understand the substance of the course. Each tutorial group is led by a designated Teaching Assistant (T.A.). Assignments will be marked by the T.A. in charge of the student's designated tutorial. Office hours and email addresses for T.A.s will be posted on CULearn.

#### **COMMUNICATION:**

CuLearn will be the primary method of electronic communication with students outside of class. It will be used to post marks, to post announcements, to host email communications and electronic discussion boards. Students should make sure that they sign-on to cuLearn in the first week of classes and should check the cuLearn page for this course on a weekly basis.

#### **EVALUATION PROCEDURES AND DEADLINES:**

Student performance in this course will be evaluated by means of **six formal evaluation components.** These are as follows:

- three assignments;
- two multiple-choice exams; and
- attendance/participation in tutorials.

Students should hand in all papers/assignments via CULearn.

**10% - Assignment 1 - due Oct. 23, 2015**. Students will be required to write a brief <u>summary and analysis</u> of an academic article that will be assigned by the instructor (2-3 double-spaced pages).

**15% - Assignment 2 - due November 27, 2015.** Students will be required to to <u>locate</u> a judgment of the Supreme Court of Canada, <u>read</u> that judgment, and <u>summarize</u> it in a case brief. In constructing your case brief, students will be asked to use a format contained in the "Case Brief Template" to be posted on CULearn.

**20% - Fall Exam -** to be held during the formal fall exam period (December 9 -21, 2015). The exam will consist of <u>short answer questions</u> only.

**20% - Assignment 3 - due March 25, 2016.** This assignment will involve writing a short paper (4-6 double spaced pages) on a topic to be assigned by the instructor.

**25% - Winter Exam -** to be held during the formal winter exam period (April 11 – 23, 2016). The exam will consist of <u>multiple-choice</u> questions only.

**10% - Tutorial Attendance and Participation.** Students are required to attend all tutorials offered. The mark awarded assesses both attendance and participation in the tutorial.

Note: There will be no make-up assignments or "grade-booster" assignments under any circumstances.

Failure to complete all assignments and exams in the course will result in the student receiving a failing grade for the course. Deferrals are granted by the Registrar's Office.

Standing in a course is determined by the course instructor subject to approval of the Department

and of the Faculty Dean. This means that grades submitted by the instructor may be subject to revision. No grades are final until they have been approved by the Dean.
