COURSE DESCRIPTION

The purpose of this course is to provide a broad introduction to the Canadian criminal legal system and to the institutions, processes, rules, and actors that comprise it. The goal is to situate the criminal law within its general social setting and to examine the interrelationship between the aspirations and practices of each. In the latter part of the course, the class will look at the criminal law in its more traditional formulations as found in the *Criminal Code* and in the cases, along with specific current issues in Canada.
