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# **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

How should human rights obligations be conceptualized, institutionalized and enforced? What are the bounds of global justice? What role does and what role should international law play in securing human rights and justice? How do international law and domestic law interact in the context of human rights?

In this course, we will consider these sorts of questions by examining the extent to which there has been a shift away from the traditional statist paradigm of international law and human rights toward a more cosmopolitan conception of morality, human rights and law. We will ask whether any shift that may be discernible is desirable in terms of enhancing global justice and the protection of human rights. We will do so by considering some key historical, political and legal developments: (1) In the post World War II era; (2) Under conditions of contemporary globalization, in general, and more particularly after the end of the Cold War; and (3) Post 9/11. Focusing on the latter, we will pose the question: what forms of global legal justice are possible under conditions of American empire and global inequality? What are the possibilities and dangers of cosmopolitanism? What role might law and legality play in securing the enforcement of human rights and protecting them against abuse and instrumentalization by powerful states? These questions are examined in the context of American empire, in general, the 'global war on terror,' in particular, and in relation to humanitarian intervention, the invasion of Iraq, and legal challenges to American empire and the rise of 'empire's law.'

An important dimension of the course will be our attempt to situate current controversies, challenges and conflicts in the emergence and consolidation of moral, political and legal responses to crimes against humanity, war crimes and genocide following World War II. To this end, we will read Hannah Arendt's important book, *Eichmann in Jerusalem*, and consider some aspects of the Nuremberg Trials. Both of these raise a question that will pervade our considerations: How should we think about, and what should we do about, law under conditions of domination, exploitation and imperialism if our aim is to develop human rights and work toward global justice, social and otherwise?

As part of our consideration of the 'enforcement' of human rights, we will consider universal jurisdiction as a way to 'litigate against empire' and the role of social movements in pressuring states to live up to human rights commitments.

### **Essay:**

The essay is due Friday November 2, 2012 <u>by noon</u>. You may hand it in to Professor Bartholomew or one of the TA's in Professor Bartholomew's office on that day <u>between 10am and noon</u>. This will ensure we have received your essay and you will know we have received it. Should you choose to deposit your essay in the Law Dept. Drop Box or submit it in any other manner, *you* assume the responsibility for it. If we do not find it there, we will assume you have not submitted it, or if we find it after the due date, we will assume it was submitted late.

The assignment is an analytical essay of 3000 words or less (under 10 double spaced pages) on Hannah Arendt's *Eichmann in Jerusalem*. More information will be provided later in the term. Please note the following:

The <u>late penalty</u> for the assignment is **1 mark per day late** (e.g. 1 day late reduces an essay mark from A to A-). Any essay received after noon on November 2 will be treated as at least one day late. *Each* weekend day will count as one day. *The professor has final say over the submission date, not the Department of Law stamp*. Any exception to the deadline must be cleared through the professor or a TA before the due date. An extension will only be granted if a student has medical or other official documentation that I judge to be convincing or an otherwise compelling reason. Late essays will also be marked last and returned after the essays that are submitted on time. Finally, late essays will receive less feedback than those submitted on time.

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## Final Exam:

The final exam will be given during the regular examination period. You will be permitted to bring 1 sheet of 8x11 inch paper into the exam with you, with notes permitted on one side only.

**Note on Class Participation:** Although no mark is assigned for class participation, lectures are designed to leave time for questions and the opportunity for students to discuss and debate course readings and topics. Consistently informed participation, reflecting regular, close reading of the assigned texts is expected. Consistently excellent participation may result in the course mark being increased by 1 mark (e.g. from B- to B).

### **GENERAL RULES:**

Failure to complete *any* aspect of the requirements may result in failure in the course.

<u>Plagiarism</u> will not be tolerated. There is a zero tolerance policy on plagiarism which means that any act of plagiarism – whether intentional or inadvertent – will be taken directly to the Dean.
