#### **GENERAL**

This course is designed to provide a broad introduction to the Canadian Criminal Legal System and to the institution, processes, rules and actors. The goal is to situate the criminal law within its general social setting and to examine the interrelationship between the aspirations and practices of each.

A strong emphasis is placed on the practical aspect of the law and how the players within

the legal system achieve justice. In the latter part of the course, the focus will be on the criminal law in its more traditional formulations as found in *The Criminal Code* of Canada and in the cases, along with specific current issues in Canada.

# **MATERIALS**

- A. Required Text: Criminal Law in Canada: An Introduction to the Theoretical, Social and Legal Context **4**<sup>th</sup> **Edition** (Toronto: Carswell, 2002).
- B. Recommended:Criminal Justice in Canada by Colin Goff 4<sup>TH</sup> edition.
- C. Recommended: *The Criminal Code* (Martin's Annual *Criminal Code* or Tremeear's). A pocket Edition of *The Criminal Code* of Canada is acceptable.
