#### **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

The course introduces students to the legal and social dimensions of criminal law in Canada within a theoretical and practical framework.

This course will examine the concepts of *mens rea*, *actus reus*, and the attachment of liability. We will then explore defences, justifications and excuses to criminal offences. The course will also have a section on *Charter* rights and protections. Finally, we will explore the many concepts and principles of sentencing in criminal law.
