GENERAL

This course is an extension of the theories and approaches that were covered in LAWS 2301. It is designed to provide a practical introduction to Criminal Law in Canada and to the institution, processes and rules. The goal is to highlight the elements of criminal offences and to examine various legal defences and their effectiveness in the system.

Students will be provided with an opportunity to put their theoretical knowledge to use in formal practice through a class assignment. In this

course, the focus will be on the legal jurisprudence and various sections *The Criminal Code* of Canada.
