# **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

This course serves as a complement to LAWS 2301, with a more practical focus. Its aim is to introduce students to both legal and social dimensions of Canadian criminal law. We will examine basic components such as the *actus reus* and *mens rea* elements of offences, along with the various ways in which persons can be found criminally liable. Defences will be examined in-depth, both those from the common law tradition as well as those codified in statute. Sentencing principles and objectives will be discussed, with a look at how they are implemented in practice. If time permits, we will also discuss certain special topics and new developments in our criminal law.

It is also strongly recommended that you have access to a copy of the Canadian *Criminal Code*, as we will discuss a number of provisions in the *Code*.
