**Course Outline** 

### **COURSE DESCRIPTION AND FORMAT:**

This course examines the Youth Criminal Justice Act. It examines substantive criminal law and procedure as it pertains to the young offenders between 12 and 17 years of age who become involved with the criminal justice system. It will examine the special rights afforded a young person under the *Youth Criminal Justice Act.* The roles of parents, judges, lawyers and the police will also form part of the discussions. The course will also highlight recent changes in sentencing for young offenders and society's perception of these changes. The role of restorative justice in dealing with young offenders will also be examined. The course will further examine the reasoning and philosophy behind the creation of a separate legislation dealing specifically with young persons before the criminal justice system. The course will also take a historical perspective of the treatment of young offenders in the Canadian criminal justice system and examine the underlining societal values that have shaped and modified the legislation dealing with young offenders.
