COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Structure and procedure of Canadian administrative authorities; policy, statutory and judicial environments in which they operate. Topics include techniques for implementing public policy and structuring public authorities; statutory interpretation; procedural safeguards; exercise of statutory discretion; reconciling efficiency and fairness.

Assignments:

Students will be required to complete two short assignments worth 15% each that will be handed out in class at least one week prior to their due dates. **The due dates are, respectively, January 29th and February 12th**. Specific instructions will be provided when the assignments are handed out in class.

Important Note:

Group work will be permitted for the assignments. However, all members of the group must be identified at the time the assignment is submitted and all members of the group will receive the same mark.

Paper:

Students will be required to write a paper about an administrative tribunal or other administrative decisionmaker. **The paper will be due at the beginning of class on March 11th; late penalties will apply.** The paper should be between 2500 and 3000 words (about 10-12 pages) (double spaced, Times New Roman, 12 font), excluding title page, table of contents, footnotes and appendices. Specific instructions will be provided in class in advance.

Final Exam:

The final exam will be a take home exam distributed during the last class. Students will be required to answer, in essay format, three of four questions drawn from required readings and class discussions throughout the entire term. The take home exam will be due on the last day of the exam period, that is, April 29th; late penalties will apply. Specific instructions will be provided in class in advance.

Each student's paper and take home exam answers must be exclusively his or her own work product. All work must be done independently; no group work or consultation other than the review class will be permitted. Students are not permitted to discuss the exam questions and possible answers with each other, with the exception of any discussion supervised by the Instructor.
