## COURSE DESCRIPTION

The course provides an overview of the major legal issues that result from business transactions conducted over telecommunication networks. The focus will be on transactions occurring through the use of the Internet and mobile networks. The course's organization will follow a thematic approach from the very beginning of an electronic transaction -- determining where an electronic transaction takes place -- to contract formation, consumer protection, privacy and intellectual property issues. Issues that have a broader societal interest, such as public safety and welfare, will also be examined.

# **COURSE FORMAT**

The course will follow a lecture and discussion format. Every week I will introduce students to the basic concepts, the fundamentals and the implications of each legal issue raised by electronic commerce and general class discussion will follow. Students must read the assigned materials in advance and be prepared to discuss them in class. In addition, every week students will be asked to volunteer to present pre-assigned articles and court cases. The class participation grade component will be based on (1) students' contributions to the class discussion; (2) voluntary in-class presentations; and (3) attendance.

## **EVALUATION** (All components must be completed in order to get a passing grade)

Standing in a course is determined by the course instructor subject to the approval of the Department and of the Faculty Dean. This means that grades submitted by the instructor may be subject to revision. No grades are final until they have been approved by the Department and the Dean.

## B. Mid-Term Exam

1. A student who is unable to write the mid-term exam because of illness or other circumstances beyond his/her control (e.g., death of a family member) may obtain permission to write an accommodation exam, provided the student meets the following conditions:

- b) Provide a medical certificate, in case of illness, or appropriate documents, in other cases (e.g. bereavement documentation). # **C. Final Examination**

1. A student who is unable to write a scheduled final exam because of illness or other circumstances beyond his/her control, or whose performance on the examination has been impaired by such circumstances, may, on application to the Registrar's Office, be granted permission to write a deferred final exam or assignment with proper documentation.

Applications for deferred final examinations must:

- a) Be made in writing to the appropriate Registrar's Office no later than five (5) business days after the date of the examination or the last day of classes; and
- b) Be fully supported in the case of illness by a medical certificate or by appropriate documents in other cases. Please note: medical documents must specify the date of the onset of the illness, the (expected) date of recovery, and the extent to which the student was/is incapacitated during the time the exam or assignment was to be prepared.

2. Granting of a deferral requires that the student has performed satisfactorily in the course according to the evaluation scheme established in the Course Outline (excluding the final exam for which deferral privileges are requested).
