COURSE DESCRIPTION The course will introduce students to the laws of Canada that govern or affect not for profit organizations and charities. The course will deal with contemporary and practical issues. The Course Pack for the course will serve as an outline of the major legal issues and serve as a framework for the consideration of topical issues and policy discussions. Supplemental materials will be periodically distributed during the seminars to permit fuller consideration of some of the major issues.

SEMINAR FORMAT: The Instructor will facilitate discussion, but the objective is to encourage a considerable degree of class participation and dialogue. The expectation is that students will have read the assigned readings prior to the seminars. Supplementary materials may be introduced at the seminars from time to time to encourage deeper consideration of the key issues and to update the assigned text.

The Assignment will be composed of a series of questions to be answered within 24 hours. The Assignment will be <u>issued on February 26 2015</u> immediately following the end of the class and will be <u>due the next day at 9 PM</u>. It will cover the course content from Sections 1 through 5 of the Course Pack and will <u>not</u> include the course content covered on February 26.

The essay is due March 26, 2015. One mark will be deducted for every day that the essay is late and in no event shall the essay be delivered later than April 2, 2015 in the absence of medical or other valid reasons. This will be followed by a 10 minute personal interview with me on the essay on either April 2, 2014 or at another mutually convenient time. The essay grade will be assigned at the conclusion of the interview.
