COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course examines the intersection of medicine and the criminal law through a variety of topics and current issues, including historical developments in the criminal law as a mechanism of social control, medical (particularly psychiatric) treatment within the prison system, laws on assisted death, and reproductive rights. The class will be primarily delivered through seminar discussions. Regular attendance and participation are crucial to success in this course.

There is no required textbook. Course readings will be available online and/or through CuLearn. Cases can be accessed on CanLii or through Carleton's library resources.
