GENERAL

This course is an extension of the theories and approaches that are typically dealt with in LAWS 2301 and 2302. It is designed to provide a combination of theoretical and practical knowledge about sentencing by reviewing the principles of sentencing. The goal is to highlight various approaches and perspectives on sentencing while examining the efficiency of the rules that guides those dealing with sentencing.

Students will be provided with an opportunity to put their theoretical knowledge to use in formal practice through a class assignment. In this course, the focus will be on legal jurisprudence and various sections *The Criminal Code* of Canada.
