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COURSE OBJECTIVE

Students will examine the legal rules, processes, and policies that govern the eligibility of citizens, permanent residents and foreign nationals to enter, remain in, work in and study in Canada. They will examine the domestic and international context in which these processes have developed and the political and social consequences of the Canadian structure. Students will also examine the international and domestic laws that define Canada's refugee protection system.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

The class will be based on lectures, discussions and in-class activities. A variety of learning tools will be employed including viewing of videos, invited speakers, and case-based learning. Each student is expected to do the background readings for each class and to be prepared to engage in discussion and analysis of the relevant issues.

METHOD OF EVALUATION

20% - Participation (Including "in-class" exercises and "take home" class assignments)

30% - Mid-term examination

50% - Final take-home examination

Assignments completed in class or assigned for the following class will be considered part of the students' Participation mark. The **mid term take home examination** will be posted on WebCT **February 15th** and will be **due before 5pm February 19th**, covering the topics discussed until that point. The final **take home examination** will be distributed at the **end of class April 5th** and will be **due electronically on April 10th at 4pm.**

Note: Late assignments will be marked down **one half-letter grade for each day submitted after the due date.** Computer failure and heavy workload will not be acceptable excuses for late assignments.
