Course Description

The one point that critics of the human treatment of non-human species agree upon is the deep confusion humanity has experienced since the questioning of our relationships together began within the broader environmental movements. This course will examine a variety of positions: legal issues; utilitarian gradualism; granting rights and abolition; activism and violence; ethics and the other; the feminist contribution; social justice; inclusion and identity; cultural difference; intimate violence.

Course Requirements

You will work in small groups to introduce the materials for one week, including preparing questions for discussion. All students are required to read the materials for each class.

This is a seminar. Therefore, a major component will be real participation in discussions. I am actually anticipating outrage and intensely held positions.
