### **COURSE OVERVIEW:**

The purpose of this course will be to introduce you to a variety of information sources available to legal researchers. It will allow you to develop the following:

- Legal research skills
- Critical thinking skills
- Writing skills (legal citation)

#### **ASSIGNMENTS:**

Students will develop their own research topic which they will refine (in consultation with the instructor) for their final paper. The course is set up so that students will be able to complete the necessary tasks in order to write a solid research paper. Students will develop a condensed research proposal, prepare an annotated bibliography, and revise their original research proposal - all in preparation for their final term paper.

Class participation in labs is <u>critical</u> to achieving success in this course! Lab time will allow students to develop their research skills to find materials on their own topics. Please note the participation mark for this course is worth 10%.

The final research paper will synthesize and analyze the relevant journal articles, case law, statutes, regulations and government documents that the student has collected during the semester. Papers will be twelve pages in length, plus bibliography.
