Times of crisis can bring out the best and the worst in people, raising questions about what we each owe to other human beings. In this course we examine what our responsibilities are in response to four extreme situations: (1) disaster and famine, (2) slavery and other unfree labour, (3) impoverishment and repression, and (4) war. Similar themes are taken up in the companion course English 1000; these two courses make up the Arts One cluster, *What Would You Do?* For more information on taking these courses through ArtsOne, go to http://www1.carleton.ca/artsone/current-clusters/what-would-you-do/.

In PHIL 1500, we will examine some ethical debates on these questions. To navigate them, we need to recognize which attempts to convince us are weaker, and which are stronger. We also need to discover which values and principles we can rely upon, and what their limitations are.

The course does not favour any particular answers to the issues which are studied. Yet it demands that students avoid mistakes and defend themselves plausibly in working out their views. It does turn out that some views are just more difficult to defend than others – for instance pro-slavery views – but it remains important to understand *why* they are indefensible.
