Evaluation

RESPONSE PAPER

Value: 5%

Date: Tuesday September 29th, 2015

Description: A paper in response to a particular issue being discussed. Topics will be given in class, but students are welcome to write on a topic not given in class. Topics must be approved by the instructor. Papers are to be submitted in class, on or before the due date. Papers must be typed, double-spaced, 12 point font Times New Roman, and must not exceed three pages. Papers should be 2-3 pages in length.

MIDTERM TEST

Value: 15%

Date: Tuesday November 24th, 2015

Description: This test will be in multiple choice, true/false, and short and long answer format.

Students will be given the entire class time to complete the test.

PRESENTATION

Value: 10%

Date: Dates will be assigned in class depending on the topic that the student chooses. **Description:** Each student will give a 7-10 minute presentation on a specific topic. This

assignment will give each student the opportunity to further explore a topic they are interested in.

PARTICIPATION AND ATTENDANCE

Value: 30% (15% each term)

Description: Attendance and participation is important if you want to succeed in this course. This evaluation will be based on the student's attendance and overall participation throughout the course. Participation will take the form of class discussions and group work. At the end of each term, students will receive a report of their participation and class attendance that can be further discussed with the instructor.

ESSAY

Value: 20%

Due date: Thursday February 25th, 2016

Description: Topics will be given in class, but students are welcome to write on a topic not given in class. Topics must be approved by the instructor. Papers are to be submitted in class, on or before the due date. Papers must be typed, double-spaced, 12 point font Times New Roman, and must not exceed 8 pages. Papers should be 6-8 pages in length. Students will be given sufficient class time to discuss ideas with peers and the instructor, and will also be given sufficient class time to work on drafts. Students may write on a topic that they have presented on, giving students the opportunity to build off of their previous work.

FINAL EXAM

Value: 20% Date: TBA

Description: This exam will be in multiple choice, true/false, and short and long answer format.

This exam will be held during the final examination period.

Any deferrals must be submitted to the registrar's office (see policies below).
