INTRODUCTION

Arts One is Carleton's unique way of structuring four credits worth of first year courses around a single theme. Our cluster, Mind Matters, is about the nature of the human mind, the nature of cognition. ASSIGNMENTS and EXAM, 2nd Semester

(1) *Term Project*, involving at least the following three stages:

- a. Research (Web and paper): Outline and *Annotated Bibliography* of about half a dozen works.
Due: Wednesday, February 2nd (10%)
- b. Writing and Further Research: Preparation of complete draft of the paper. Due: Wednesday, March 2nd (15%)
** We recommend that you consult us in the course of preparing this draft. **
- c. Rewriting of Paper on the basis of comments. Due: Tuesday, April 5th (25%) (Papers to be dropped in the Philosophy dropbox, Fl. 3A, Paterson)

You will be given a number of scenarios and you will be asked to write an essay on one of them. You may change scenario after your outline if you prepare a new bibliography and outline.

Handing an assignment in late requires prior permission. If you do not have permission to hand something in late, you will be penalized 10% of the value of that assignment per day. 'On time' means up to midnight of the due date.

(2) *Final Exam* (30%)

As in 1st term, about twenty review questions will be distributed before the end of the course. All questions will be selected from these review questions. The purpose of the exam is to encourage an overview of the course and a review of the material covered. Three hours will be scheduled.

Assignments:

Unless specifically told otherwise by their instructors, students:

- must not use a plastic or cardboard cover or paper clips
- must staple the paper
- must include the following in the lower right corner of the cover sheet:
 - student name
 - student number
 - course number and section
 - instructor's name
- The Philosophy Department does not accept assignments by FAX. You may send them by courier, if necessary.
- No assignments will be accepted after the last day for handing in term work.
- Assignments handed in through the essay box (just inside the glass doors, Paterson Hall, Floor 3A) must be dropped into the box by 4:15 on a regular business day in order to be date-stamped with that day's date. Assignments handed in after 4:15 or on a non-business day will be stamped as having been handed in on the next business day.
- Students are required to keep copies of their assignments. If your paper is lost at any point, you will be considered not to have submitted it if you cannot produce a copy immediately on request.

Deferrals for Term Work:

If you miss a final examination and/or fail to submit a final assignment by the due date because of circumstances beyond your control, you may apply for a deferral of examination/assignment. For deferred examinations, you must apply within 5 working days after the scheduled date of your exam. To apply for deferral of a final assignment, you must apply within 5 working days of the last scheduled day of classes. Visit the Registrar's Office for more information.

Academic Accommodation:

For Students with Disabilities: Students with disabilities requiring academic accommodations in this course must register with the Paul Merton Centre for Students with Disabilities (PMC) for a formal evaluation of disability-related needs. Documented disabilities include but are not limited to mobility/physical impairments, specific Learning Disabilities (LD), psychiatric/psychological disabilities, sensory disabilities, Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD), and chronic medical conditions. Registered PMC students are required to contact the PMC every term to have a Letter of Accommodation sent to the Instructor by their Coordinator. In addition, students are expected to confirm their need for accommodation with the Instructor no later than two weeks before the first assignment is due or the first in-class test/midterm. If you require accommodations only for formally scheduled exam(s) in this course, you must request accommodations by the last official day to withdraw from classes in each term.

For Religious Observance: Students requesting academic accommodation on the basis of religious observance should make a formal, written request to their instructors for alternate dates and/or means of satisfying academic requirements. Such requests should be made during the first two weeks of class, or as soon as possible after the need for accommodation is known to exist, but no later than two weeks before the compulsory academic event.
