Course Description

The purpose of this course is to introduce students to both influential figures and problems in the history of philosophy and methodologies for doing philosophy today. We will consider questions such as: What is the good life? What is existence? And: What is justice?

Policies and Procedures:

1. Professionalism: I require that students adopt a professional attitude towards class conduct. Please be on time and wait to leave until class is over.
