<u>Required Course Materials</u>: You do not have to purchase a textbook or course pack for this course. All the readings required for this course are available from free online sources (the list of all required texts follows below).

This book might be helpful (no need to purchase it!): Norman Melchert, *The Great Conversation: A Historical Introduction to Philosophy*, Oxford University Press, 2007.

Objectives: The question of the meaning of life is one of the most fundamental and enduring philosophical questions. The primary objective of this course is to introduce students to different philosophical approaches to the question of the meaning of life. The course will take a historical rather than thematic approach. Thus, we will start from antiquity and finish with 20th century philosophy. You will get introduced to different perspectives on the question of the meaning of life such as the nihilist, the supra-natural, the pragmatist, the existentialist, etc. A secondary objective of the course is to introduce you to some basic aspects of expressing your views on such matters in a written form via philosophical essay which will be the final assignment for this course.

Course Evaluation:

There are two in-class midterms for this course, each worth 30% of the final mark. In addition, there is one take-home final assignment in the form of a philosophical essay, worth 40% of the final mark. The in-class midterms and the final take-home assignment/essay consist of a certain number of questions (you will be able to choose from a number of questions for the in-class tests but not for the take-home assignments) to be answered. The take-home assignment questions and instructions will be posted on cuLearn on the last day for this class. Midterm topics will also be posted in advance on cuLearn.

Note that the Philosophy Department at Carleton has decided to abstain from printing out course outlines and/or handouts except in rare cases. In agreement with this new effort to save paper and ink, all handouts will be available on the course web-site on cuLearn.

Final take-home assignment: Sunday, December 21, 2014.

All the tests are based upon the material and discussions **covered in class**.

Note: There are no mock or make-up tests scheduled for this course. A make-up test or due date extension will be provided **only** upon presentation of a verifiable doctor's note. A failure to provide one will result in 0 (zero) on the given assignment! It is the responsibility of the student to contact the professor as soon as possible with any official documentation the student might have, justifying his/her absence from the test/assignment/exam and schedule a make-up midterm/assignment/exam. All such arrangements must be made directly with the professor.

Please note that neither the professor nor the TA will provide slides and/or lecture notes, regardless of the reason the student has missed a given class. It is the responsibility of the student to find a way to recover the missed lecture.

If you require a note taker, please contact PMC as soon as possible to be accommodated.

No electronic copies of any of the final assignments will be accepted unless there is a medical or other documented emergency!

Note: Please note that the syllabus is subject to changes and modifications due to time constraints and in-class progress!

The Teaching Assistant is responsible for marking all the tests and exams. If a disagreement over a mark occurs, the student needs to see the marker (Teaching Assistant) first and discuss the mark/test/exam. The professor will not discuss the assignments/marks with the student unless the student has seen the TA first. If the disagreement persists, the student can appeal the mark to the professor. However, the professor reserves the right to raise or lower the mark despite the mark that has already been assigned.

The standard time for returning marked tests/exams is two weeks from the date of the test/exam. However, in some cases, it may require more time. Announcements of any changes will be made in class or posted on the web-site of the course.

Neither the Teaching Assistant, nor the professor will weigh any of the tests/exams any differently than the value that has been originally assigned to them.

Border marks will not be 'bumped up'. In other words, a 79 is a B+ and will not be 'bumped up' to an A-, unless the student has a good reason to contest his or her mark. 'I studied really hard for this course' or 'I need an A- average', or 'I'm on academic probation and I really need to pass' are not good reasons!
