COURSE SUMMARY

The aim of this course is to explore a number of questions about the meaning of life and related issues: Does life have any meaning or purpose, and, if it didn't, would it matter? Does the meaning of life depend on the existence of God and an afterlife? Should we fear death? Is there such a thing as the good life, or the best way to live one's life, and, if so, what is it? Does the question "Does life have meaning?" itself have any clear meaning? What is it that makes life valuable or worthwhile?

In addressing these and other questions, we will examine many different approaches that have been defended by philosophers, writers and other reflective people, both in the past and the present, including theism, nihilism, hedonism, existentialism, stoicism, Buddhism and many others. We will subject their answers to careful critical scrutiny and do our best to develop our own original approaches to the issues.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Midterm: There will be a midterm exam which will be worth 30% of the final grade. It will have the following form: one week before the date of the midterm a list of questions on topics central to the material covered will be distributed to students; the instructor will then select a number of these questions for students to answer on the midterm.

Term Paper: Students will be required to write a term paper worth 30% of the final grade. The paper will be about 6 – 8 pages in length (1500 – 2000 words). It will not be a research paper that requires library or Internet sources, but will consist of a critical discussion of some topic or issue central to the course. A list of topics, along with instructions and guidelines for writing the paper, will be available early in the term.

Final Examination: There will be a final exam, worth 40% of the final grade, scheduled during the examination period. It will have the same format as the midterm.

ACCESS TO CULEARN

Students must ensure that they have access to cuLearn, as class lectures and other material will be posted on it.

REQUIRED TEXT

The Meaning of Life: A Reader, 3rd edition, edited by E.D. Klemke and Steven M. Cahn (Oxford: Oxford University Press)

In addition to this text, some required readings will be taken from online sources. (The web addresses for these readings are provided in the list of Topics and Readings on CuLearn.)

CLASS FORMAT

The emphasis in the course will be on reasoning, analysis and critical evaluation. The role of the Instructor will be to guide students through the readings, to ensure that discussions remain focused on relevant and important issues, and to illustrate the processes of analysis and criticism by repeated example in class. Although attendance will not be taken, students are fully responsible for material missed due to absence.

- 2) The religious approach – The meaning of life is dependent on God

- 6) Stoicism and Buddhism – To achieve happiness we must control our desires
- 7) The meaning and purpose of life is to promote the good
- 8) The meaning of life consists of the pursuit of projects of worth and value
- 9) The meaning or life is to develop your potential as a human being
- 10) Deconstructing the Issue – the question 'what is the meaning of life?' has no meaning

Assignments:

Unless specifically told otherwise by their instructors, students:
