Course Description

This course examines current and historic approaches to ethics. Throughout the term we will explore four areas of ethical study— descriptive ethics, normative ethics, metaethics and applied ethics—and investigate how they apply to contemporary social issues. There will be overlap between these approaches; however, each will also have its own associated methodologies and issues. We will examine ethical issues primarily through the lens of philosophy, but also where relevant through those of psychology, neuroscience, and other related disciplines. There will be a strong emphasis placed on social issues such as animal welfare, euthanasia, abortion, pornography, and others.

Course Text

The required textbook used for this course is **The Fundamentals of Ethics** (2015) by Russ Shafer Landau. This will be used starting in February and is available through the Carleton bookstore.

Other required readings are listed in the course calendar and may be added to at the instructor's discretion.

Evaluation

This course is comprised of 3 components of evaluation -2 exams and a term paper (as described below).

Missed Exams
