General Overview:

This course has been restructured from previous years with a broader focus on the role of nonverbal interactions on communication. Psychological, philosophical, and linguistic evidence will be used to generate novel examples of traditional philosophical arguments in the philosophy of language. Topics will include the role of body language in detecting deception, animal communication, the role of implicature, and how phrases get their meaning. Differing from previous years, there will be less analysis of primary source readings. Instead, the focus will be on understanding the major arguments and objections to the major theories in the philosophy of language.

Students are expected to attend class, complete all required readings, and complete all evaluation components to receive a passing grade. This course is geared to students with little or no background in philosophy or linguistics.

Evaluation:

There are a number of components that will be used to determine your final grade in this course: a WebCT Blog, a journal article synopsis, a group project, and a take-home final examination.

a) Take Home Examination (30%):

The take-home exam will consist of short- and long-answer questions. Answers should reflect an understanding of the topics discussed in class and attempt to integrate theories. While students are encouraged to discuss content, each student must write their own unique answers (i.e., rules of plagiarism below still apply). The exam will be handed out on December 6th and will be due on December 22nd by noon in the Philosophy Essay drop-box.

b) Group Project (35%):

The group project will consist of groups of four (4) students generating a short 5 minute video on a topic (TBD) with an accompanying group-generated 6-8 page research paper. Group project ideas will be due October 4th, videos will be due November 8th, and papers due November 15th. More information will be available on WebCT.

c) Journal Article Synopsis (20%):

You will be expected to prepare a journal article synopsis with a maximum of 1000 words (2 page single-spaced; 12pt font; 1" margins). Selections will be made available on the WebCT system. The synopsis will consist of a concise critical summary of the main points of a chosen article. A guide will be available on WebCT with a grading rubric. We will go over the requirements for these synopses in-class. The goal of these synopses is to help you organize your thoughts and critically evaluate arguments in a clear and concise manner. The synopsis will be due October 18th, 2010.

d) WebCT Blog (15%):

Each student has a public weblog. This is a forum for you to post about the topics discussed in class and expand upon any thoughts/ideas that interested you. It is expected that students post at least once every second week (i.e., minimum 6 posts). You can also comment on posts from other blogs. There is no minimum length for each entry; your grade will be determined by the quality of your thought. More information will be available on WebCT.

Assignments:

Unless specifically told otherwise by their instructors, students:

Academic Accommodation:

For Students with Disabilities: Students with disabilities requiring academic accommodations in this course must register with the Paul Menton Centre for Students with Disabilities (PMC) for a formal evaluation of disability-related needs.
