Course Description

What makes the person the same person over time? Is it their mind, their body, their consciousness? Can several persons inhabit the same human body? Can one person become another person during their lifetime? Is there a self at all? Questions such as these, as well as possible answers to them, will be at the core of this course. We will explore them through readings, movies, and discussions.

Course requirements

One midterm exam (30%), consisting mainly of multiple choice questions and short questionsanswers, one final take-home exam (50%), which will be in essay form (6-8 pages), and one essay (2-3 pages) (20%). Announcements will be made, assignments given, and materials presented in class, and it is your responsibility to keep track of this.
