Course description:

A philosophical examination of some characteristic concepts of religion, such as faith, hope, worship, revelation, miracle, God.

Listed as PHIL 2601 and RELI 2738. Precludes additional credit for RELI 2601.

Prerequisite(s): a course in philosophy or second-year standing.

Required text (available at the Carleton bookstore, or various places online):

Philosophy of Religion: Selected Readings, fifth edition, ed. Michael Peterson, William Hasker, Bruce Reichenbach, and David Basinger (Oxford University Press, 2014)

cuLearn:

This course will be supported by the cuLearn Course Management System. You can access your cuLearn account by going to www.carleton.ca/culearn and entering your MyCarletonOne username and password.

A variety of resources as well as important information will be made available through the cuLearn site, including assignment topics and due dates, test dates, and schedule(s) of readings, which will be updated through the semester. Students will be fully responsible for reading and responding appropriately to all information distributed through the cuLearn Course Page. Information provided on this page will be considered to have been provided to all registered students within 24 hours of posting.

Evaluation:

1. Term work: two short papers (40%)

Two short papers will be due over the course of the semester. I will ask you to reconstruct and evaluate a short argument or passage from a philosophical text. Topics will be made available **on cuLearn** two weeks before papers are due. Papers are to be submitted **on cuLearn**.

Papers should be two-three pages long, double-spaced and with standard (12-point) font and margins. Each paper will be worth **20%** of your final grade, for a total of **40%**.

Note: All assignments must be the result of an individual (i.e., non-collaborative) effort.

2. Test (20%)

There will be an *in-class*, *closed-book* test mid-way through the semester, worth **20%** of your final grade. You will be permitted to bring a one-page, double-sided "cheat sheet" to the test, upon which you may write or type whatever you like, using whatever size fonts / margins you like. (Note however that you will not be permitted to use any visual aids such as magnifying glasses during the test.)

3. Final exam (40%)

There will be a formally scheduled examination during final exam period, worth **40%** of your final grade. Like the mid-term test, the final exam will be closed-book, but you will be permitted to bring a one-page, double-sided "cheat sheet" upon which you may write or type whatever you like, using whatever size fonts / margins you like. (Note however that you will not be permitted to use any visual aids such as magnifying glasses during the final.)

Some course policies:

- **1. Lateness penalties:** Assignments will be penalized by one third of a grade per day for every day that they are late. For instance, an assignment marked B+ on its merits will be reduced to a B on the first day that it is late, and to a C- on the fifth day.
- **2. Extensions**: Extensions *may* be granted only if requested *at least 24 hours in advance* and *with a valid reason* (e.g., medical reason). There will be no extensions granted for tests or exams.

Assignments:

Unless specifically told otherwise by their instructors, students:

- No assignments will be accepted after the last day for handing in term work – see dates in next column.
- Assignments handed in through the essay box (just inside the glass doors, Paterson Hall, Floor 3A) must be dropped into the box by 4:15 on a regular business day in order to be date-stamped with that day's date. Assignments handed in after 4:15 or on a non-business day will be stamped as having been handed in on the next business day.
- Students are required to keep copies of their assignments. If your paper is lost at any point, you will be considered not to have submitted it if you cannot produce a copy immediately on request.

Deferrals for Term Work:

If you miss a final examination and/or fail to submit a final assignment by the due date because of circumstances beyond your control, you may apply for a deferral of examination/assignment. For deferred examinations (both formally scheduled and take-homes), you must apply within 3 working days after the scheduled date of the exam.
