Course description:

European philosophy of the 18th century. Representative works of writers such as Berkeley, Hume, and Kant.

Prerequisite: 0.5 credit in philosophy and second-year standing in a philosophy program, or permission of the department.

Required text (available at the Carleton bookstore):

1. Modern Philosophy: An Anthology of Primary Sources. Eds. Roger Ariew and Eric Watkins. Hackett 2010.

Note: Many of the primary sources in this anthology can be found online. However, some online sources are abridged or otherwise altered. If you wish to consult an online source, you *must* discuss this with me, so I can help you evaluate whether or not the source is appropriate.

Some of you may wish to purchase primary sources on their own (rather than in an anthology.) If you wish to do this, please let me know. I will be happy to recommend specific (unabridged) editions of the texts.

Course material may sometimes include some readings that are not in the required text. Those readings will either be available on cuLearn or through the Carleton library website.

Evaluation:

- 1. Tests There will be two in-class tests, each worth 25% of your final grade, for a total of 50%. Tests will be closed-book, but you will be permitted to bring a one-page, double-sided "cheat sheet" to each, on which you may write or type whatever you like, using whatever sized fonts / margins you like. (Note however that you will not be permitted to use any visual aids such as magnifying glasses during the test.)
- 2. Examination There will be one take-home examination, due at the end of final exam period (**April 23**rd, **2016**.) The exam will be essay-based and will count towards **50%** of your final grade.

Course policies:

1. Lateness/extensions – The take-home exam is due on the final day of exam period. It is university policy that no student work may be accepted after the final day of exam period. As such, I will not be accepting late papers, and no extensions will be granted.
